### Exeter & Teign Valley Railway visit – May 15<sup>th</sup> 2019 Jon Kelsey

3 years on from our previous visit, a group of 10 DRSA members visited Colin Burges's E&TVR at Christow on May 15<sup>th</sup>. It was encouraging to see a couple of unfamiliar faces in the party.



We enjoyed charging around the site's 2 gauge peripheral line on foot the anthropomotive 'Jenny Wren' 4 seater saloon based on a mine wagon, and watched Tony Hill demonstrate the low rolling resistance of a 9 ton railway van, or seeing Burges singlehandedly Colin manhandling 16cwt of Wickham trolley onto the track via a portable turntable. This electronic ignition time the on the immaculate Wickham didn't let the side down and enabled the party to travel the standard gauge demonstration line.

The Matisa Neptune track measuring vehicle is in running order and carried us a few yards sounding very crisp; sadly this almost unique machine might be destined for scrap due to a lack of demand. Since the last visit, Mr Burges has built a Wickham shed and



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permanent way tool store with an authentic feel, and started restoring a GWR 'Toad' brakevan for a station-owning neighbour. We enjoyed just wandering around making interesting discoveries, whether artefacts like the length of bridge rail on display, or more abstract concepts like how

embarrassingly well organised the workshops are.

It's an extraordinary place, unlike any other railway site. Several of us have now been twice and would happily go again. Visiting the E&TVR website is essential. Our thanks to Colin Burges for his hospitality, not least of which was an enjoyable high quality lunch in the brakevan. Thanks also to Tony Hill for arranging the visit.

## **2019 Annual General Meeting**

This year's AGM was held on Saturday May 11<sup>th</sup> at our regular venue, the Ockment Centre, Okehampton. The turnout of 20 members was slightly disappointing, but we console ourselves with the thought that people are more likely to turn out if there's something to complain about. There's also a sense of being in a limbo until major decisions about the railway's future are made later in the year.

Our Chairman, the Reverend Philip Wagstaff, gave a comprehensive report on the heritage services and commercial operations which took place on the Dartmoor Railway in the previous 12 months, and the many ways in which DRSA members were able to support them. DRSA is also contributing to the discussions currently taking place about reinstating an Exeter to Okehampton service. Philip thanked the committee and active volunteers for their work, and the entire membership for their financial and moral support. He noted with sadness the passing of several members in the preceding year, notably committee member and former Pony editor Peter Ritchie, and Dartmoor authority Martin Stephens-Hodge.

Copies of the 2019 accounts were available at the meeting, and are printed on page 10. Clearly our finances are in good hands, as there were no difficult questions for our Treasurer, Christine Horner. Chris drew attention to a generous funeral collection donation by the widow of another recently lost member, Cyril Pawley. This has been used to fund the restoration of the SR brakevan LDS55625.

Membership secretary Geoff Horner announced that we have 112 single members and 46 pairs of joint members, a total of 204, 5 more than this time last year. At the end of 2018 membership stood at 220, a target we hope to exceed this year.

Geoff moved on to his report as Volunteer Coordinator. We have about 40 active volunteers, a remarkable proportion of our total membership. He highlighted the efforts of those who help behind the scenes, and commented on the frequent praise received from visitors about Okehampton station and museum, and about the condition of DRSA rolling stock. Without DRSA volunteers DR heritage services wouldn't operate, and the events trains would be a struggle.

Several Travelling Ticket Inspectors have recently been trained, and driver training is ongoing, though Geoff didn't know if there will be more opportunities. More volunteers would be very welcome, especially in Station Maintenance and the shop. To this end another batch of brochures has been printed after a small update, and is being distributed.

A Q&A session provided discussion about methods of payment, and about the impact on DR heritage services of the proposed Okehampton to Exeter service – the latter question unanswerable with anything more precise than 'wait and see'.

There had been no new nominations for committee membership, so the existing committee was re-elected. Thus the 2019/2020 committee remains as listed on the inside back cover.

Enhanced refreshments – courtesy of Sue Baxter and Roxana Kelsey – seemed to be a popular 2019 development. After this we started to watch the Dartmoor Railway Highlights 2006 DVD until it failed at one third distance. Fortunately Geoff had had the foresight to bring an alternative, and we watched a DVD about driving and operating Southern steam locomotives with some jealousy.

## Rail Operations & Line Update

### Line Update

Ongoing work has included vegetation control, fishplate oiling and other ongoing maintenance. The track at Okehampton station alongside platform 2 has been slewed to enable it be permissible for trains to run past each other.

### **Traction Update**

**D4167/08937:** 'Bluebell Mel' has worked the heritage service on all non-event days, performing admirably. It has also been used on the events rake in a top and tail formation with 31452. It has also been used on engineering trains.

## 1132 (Thumper Unit): The



overhaul of 1132 continues at Meldon in the capable hands of the Carriage & Wagon crew. See C&W report for full details. It is still hoped that 1132 will form part of the heritage service in 2019 though not clear at present when this might be.

**31452:** The class 31 has been used on the events rake in a top and tail formation with 08937. There is still no news on the potential arrival of 31285 from Weardale.

### **Heritage Services**

Heritage services started on Saturday March 30<sup>th</sup>. Using 08937, Lab 11 and the LMS brake van. The FK carriage had issues with its vacuum brakes resulting in it being removed from the rake prior to the start of the service. The train now runs as an air braked rake. C&W is working hard to get the FK back into service as soon as possible

### **Events Trains**

To date we have had Afternoon Tea Trains and the Peppa Pig day. Some events have been cancelled, but there are still a number expected to run throughout the season.

#### **GWR Exeter Sunday Services**

This service will start May 19<sup>th</sup> and run until September 8<sup>th</sup>. GWR provided Class 150 unit 150261 for the first day of the service. It proved to be well patronised.

This year also sees the return of the bus across the moor, with 2 buses arriving and departing Okehampton station on the same days the Exeter trains run. These buses run via Tavistock to Gunnislake and Callington.

## **Volunteer Activities**

With the 2019 heritage train service between Okehampton and Meldon Viaduct well underway our DRSA volunteers, around 40 in number, are once again to be found busy working all round the railway.

## Carriage & Wagon group

## 'Thumper' unit 1132

The driving trailer's repaint was completed in the latter part of last year since when the power car has been in the shed and work on this has kept members of the group busy. The driving cab and guard's compartment have been repainted, both sides of the vehicle have had the grey undercoat applied and by the time you read this at least one green top coat to the south side will have been completed. The painting of the bogies and under frame has commenced as has the freshening up of the interior paintwork.

### Ex SR Goods Brake Van

The old timber flooring to the cabin and verandas has been removed and new flooring installed. The same has been done to side and end timbers and roof. The laborious task of chipping off the rust to the under-frame continues. The buffers to the west end have been removed, overhauled, refitted, primed and repainted. New vacuum brake hoses are in stock ready to be fitted and new footboards to both sides have been made, installed and painted. The next major task to be undertaken will be the laying of the new canvas roof covering – a task the group have never undertaken before so possibly a steep learning curve lies ahead.

### First class corridor compartment carriage (FK) - S13436

The repainting following the graffiti attacks of last year has now been completed. Unfortunately the vacuum brake system failed its Fitness To Run examination. However replacement parts have been purchased and fitting of these has commenced so hopefully the carriage will soon resume its place in the heritage train.

### Lab11 and ex LMS Goods Brake Van

These two vehicles are currently forming the heritage train set fortunately so far without any major problems arising – touch wood!

Recently DRSA has acquired, via Ebay, this former Okehampton signalbox telephone. It would have been used for communication with other signalboxes. It was made by Ericsson. After a good cleanup, and some research into it, it will go on display in the Okehampton station museum.

Progress is being made, albeit slowly, on smartening up some of the museum paintwork and adding additional individual items to the displays. Another recent addition is a milk churn from Ambrosia at nearby Lifton.



People from all around the UK and overseas continue to sign the visitors' book and the feedback comments are overwhelmingly positive.

## **Station Gardening – Just Step Across!**

Just step across! Penny had the idea of making a stepping path where stone passengers already take a short cut across grass from the car park. It enhances the area and the stones themselves have reliefs of a half penny, dragonfly a and a honeybee which

young children might like to feel.

The three-year old *sweet williams* are a "wow" at the moment, having taken a year longer than usual to flower. In the foreground are clumps of golden oregano and lemon balm which give a lovely colour contrast and can be rubbed and smelt by those "in the know" as they pass by.

Our watering team is in full swing. Mavis arrives with her trolley on which Ann balances up to five watering cans. Then with great patience Ann waters each parched container a little at a time and repeatedly over the course of a couple of hours so that they are ready for the next dry week! We are also lucky that Paul, when watering the train, will also turn the hose to our tubs and the grit boxes on Platform 2. Shrinkage of the compost away from the sides in dry weather is generally less in our wooden and ceramic containers than in the plastic.

Jobs for the weekend ahead include moving crowded foxglove selfseeded seedlings (after watering well!) to the bank by the Signal Box so they can flower and seed again. Also a clean out and replacement of sticks in our Bee Hotels. Research shows that they can harbour disease, so it is best to change the sticks each year. Leaving hollow sticks standing overwinter or on the ground also gives insects safe nesting and hibernating spaces. Hopefully you all have a chance to enjoy plants and insects too this summer!

## **Crediton Museum 2019 Exhibition**

For 2019, the volunteer-run Crediton Museum is presenting a railwaythemed exhibition entitled 'Crediton Station: A Brief Encounter'. Its aim is to show how the coming of the railway affected the town and its people. Crediton Area History and Museum Society's exhibition team has depicted the social impact of the railway, constructing a number of tableaux illustrating local men going off to war, wounded soldiers coming to the VAD hospitals, local trades which utilised the railway, holidaymakers, commuters etc.



Part of the exhibition, and to an extent the inspiration for it, is the Scale Seven Group's excellent model of Crediton's historic station in Edwardian times, previously on display at the station tearoom. When the Turning Tides Project took over the tearoom, CAHMS became custodian of the model, thanks to the good offices of the Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership.



The exhibition opened on April 10th and will be open until October 26th Wednesdays to Fridays from 1000 to 1600 and Saturdays from 1000 to 1300. The Museum is at The Old Town Hall, High Street, Crediton, EX17 3LF (the junction with Searle St.)

Finally I want to share with you a bit of heaven. If you pad out of the station up the hill towards Dartmoor you will pass a five-bar gate to a wood, where there was a short terrace of railway cottages, and then existing railway houses to the right. The woods are full of bluebells, but if you continue and cross over the A30 on the footbridge you come to a whole hillside in the open covered by bluebells amongst flowering gorse, apple trees and May blossom on the hawthorn. Can you sniff the scents?
